Children's Liturgy of the Word

Readings

First: Isaiah 61:1-2 Gospel: John 1:19-28

3rd Sunday of Advent – Year B—Joy!

Joy is the word of the day. Rejoice. Give thanks. Gaudete Sunday.

In our first reading, Isaiah tells us how God calls us to respond to the Lord's coming. The reading is like a hymn of rejoicing. Our baptism has called us to respond with joy as instruments of a Joyful God. We sing our thanks and praise to God, particularly in our responsorial Psalm! We pray with, through and in Jesus before God, who has enabled this to happen. We are full to overflowing with Joy and Hope.

We hear about John the Baptist again this week, a person sure of purpose and mission. We can pray to God and ask God to give us Hope and Joy to be like him, sure of the path God wants us to walk. If we are unsure or have gone our way a bit, what better time is there to find the path once more and set our feet back on it with renewed resolve?

The single pink candle on the Advent wreath reminds us of a pink sky before sunrise that a new day is upon us. Advent reminds us that we are awaiting the day when Jesus comes.

Objectives

- † To present John the Baptist as a model to follow as a disciple of Christ.
- † To recognize that the Advent candle is a sign of Joy in the coming of Christ.

Leader's Preparation:

- † Pray the Lectionary readings.
- † Review the background.
- † Reflect upon the reflection questions.

Environment and Materials

- † Two screened adult leaders.
- † Liturgical space; the liturgical colour is Purple or Violet.
- [†] Violet cloth, a Lectionary, a candle, and an Advent Wreath. Light **two purple** or violet candles and **one pink** candle.
- † Place the Bible in a prominent location for the children to see.
- † Select volunteers (older children or adults) to proclaim the readings.
- † Display the responsorial psalm refrain lyrics, if possible and desired.
- † Display the Creed, if possible and desired.

Images in the Readings

- † Witness for the light
- † Baptize with water
- † Anointed
- † Pray constantly

Background

First Reading: Isaiah

- † Isaiah is speaking one who is announcing good news.
- † God created a jubilee year, which occurs every 50th year.
- † Property and debts are forgiven, and God sends Jesus to obtain forgiveness for our sins.
- † What do we do to help people feel comfort and release from hardship?

Gospel: John

- † John the Baptist lived in the desert and told people to change their lives so they would be ready for someone more important than he was.
- † The gospel proclamation focuses on John the Baptist's testimony.
- † The Jewish people anxiously awaited the Messiah and hoped that John the Baptist was the Messiah they sought.
- † John's testimony makes the truth crystal clear about who the Messiah is.
- † An important point to make today is to always point to Jesus with Joy!

Leader's Reflection Questions

- † Why do we rejoice on the Third Sunday of Advent?
- † Why does John point the way to Jesus?
- † Where do you find Jesus in your daily life?

The Liturgy

Procession from the main Church

After the opening prayer, when all are seated, the leaders come forward and stand facing the altar.

Priest: My dear children, today we are halfway through Advent. We call this day Gaudete Sunday or Joy Sunday. God wants us to rejoice in Jesus! Soon, Christmas will be here. Rejoice and go in peace.

When most of the children have formed a procession, the leader with the book proceeds to the place of the celebration. The second leader usually walks behind the children. Upon arrival at the location of the celebration, the leader places the book on the prepared table.

Welcome.

The leaders assist the children to sit and prepare. Begin with the Sign of the Cross. Help the children think about and connect their actions as they touch their foreheads, shoulders, and stomachs. The Sign of the Cross can be made while seated. It is a liturgical opportunity in itself to help children think about God. The leader may say the following prayer in these or similar words.

O God, help us to understand your word with open hearts and increase our faith. Through Christ our Lord.

Invite the children to listen to the Gospel.

First Reading

A reading from the book of the Prophet Isaiah.

The Spirit of the Lord has come to me

because he has chosen me.

The Lord has sent me to tell the oppressed the good news,

to heal the brokenhearted,

and to announce freedom for prisoners and captives.

This is the year when the Lord God

will show kindness to us and punish our enemies.

The Lord has sent me to comfort all who mourn.

The Word of the Lord.

Gospel

The children stand for the Gospel. The leader proclaims the Gospel.

All respond: Glory to you, Lord.

All sign themselves on the forehead, lips and breast.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

The Jewish leaders in Jerusalem sent priests and temple helpers to ask John who he was.

He told them plainly, "I am not the Messiah."

Then, when they asked him if he was Elijah, he said, "No, I am not!"

And when they asked if he was the prophet, he also said, "No!"

Finally, they said, "Who are you then? We have to answer the ones who sent us. Tell us who you are!"

John answered in the words of the prophet Isaiah,

"I am only someone shouting in the desert: make the road ready for the Lord."

Some Pharisees had also been sent to John.

They asked him, "Why are you baptizing people if you are not the Messiah, or Elijah or the Prophet?"

John told them, "I use water to baptize people.

But here with you is someone you do not know.

Even though I came first,

I am not good enough to untie his sandals."

John said this as he was baptizing east of the Jordan River in Bethany.

The Gospel of the Lord.

The leader concludes the Gospel with The Gospel of the Lord. All respond: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ. The children sit to listen to the reflection.

Reflection

The leader may offer this reflection in these or similar words. Please consider the amount of time available to return to the main assembly. The leader may wish to reduce the number of questions.

An excellent place to begin is the question:

What did you hear?

Parents (Moms and/or Dads) and grandparents teach us a lot about Jesus.

What are some things they have taught us?

Allow the children to share.

Why do we believe them?

Allow the children to share.

We also learn about Jesus when we come to Mass and listen to the Gospel as we did a few minutes ago. Sometimes, certain people in the Bible also teach us essential things about Jesus. Today's Gospel tells us that John the Baptist knew that Jesus is God's Son.

What did John the Baptist tell the Jewish leaders when they asked about him? John said he was not the Messiah, Elijah, or the Prophet.

John said this about himself and Jesus because he knew Jesus was the Son of God. He told the people that Jesus was among them even though they did not recognize him. The people who came to see John the Baptist believed his words. We believe John the Baptist because he proved himself trustworthy and knew Jesus.

Following the reflection, the prayer leader invites everyone to stand to profess our faith. Recite the Creed or use the sample below to ask the children to respond.

The Creed

Depending on the time, a simple profession of faith may be made (see below).

Leader: Do you believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth?

All: We do believe.

Leader: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, who became our brother and

gave his life for us?

All: We do believe.

Leader: Do you believe in the Holy Spirit who lives in our hearts and gives us

everlasting life?

All: We do believe.

Leader: This is our faith. This is the faith of the Church. We are proud to profess it.

Prayer of the Faithful

Invite the children to think of the needs of others and to announce their petitions. The leaders may begin the intercessions by announcing the needs they know. It may be necessary for the leader to repeat and/or paraphrase the petition and conclude it with the cue for the response: For this, we pray. All respond to each petition by saying: Lord, hear our prayer. Sample intercessions are below.

Leader: We listened to God's Word and now pray to our God who loves us.

The response is: Lord, hear our prayer.

That the Church prepares the way for the Lord's return.

Let us pray to the Lord.

R Lord, hear our prayer.

That we will help our family, classmates and teachers.

Let us pray to the Lord.

R Lord, hear our prayer.

That God will heal the sick and help those who care for them.

Let us pray to the Lord.

R Lord, hear our prayer.

The leader may invite other intercessions from the children or add intercessions based on the Church's current needs, the world, or the local community.

That our family and friends who have died may know God's happiness.

Let us pray to the Lord.

R Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: O God, as we joyfully prepare our hearts to celebrate the birth of

Jesus, we ask you to grant our prayers.

The leader may invite other intercessions from the children or add intercessions based on the Church's current needs, the world, or the local community.

Ask the children to return to the main assembly. Ask them to return quietly and perhaps think about what they have heard and are now doing.

Be mindful of children having difficulty finding their families.


Get Ready for the Lord!


Jewish leaders sent people to ask John the Baptist if he was the Messiah or Elijah or the Prophet.

Family Corner

FAITH FOCUS

John the Baptist, referring to the prophet Isaiah, told those who asked that he was a "voice in the wilderness." He called their attention to someone far greater than he. Though they did not recognize him, that "someone" was already among them.

John's mission was to prepare the people for Jesus, the Light of the World. John reminds us all to shine our lights toward Jesus. And Jesus is among us, too!

FAMILY ACTIVITY

Encourage your family to let Jesus' light shine through their words and actions. Gather one evening, turn the lights low, and pass a flashlight from person to person. In turn, while holding the flashlight, tell how your own actions can shine the light of Jesus to others. Tell about a time when you could see Jesus' light shine through the words or actions of someone else.
